

2: Abbey Gateway

The Abbey Gateway was the main entrance into Abingdon Abbey. The present gateway dates from the 15th century.



3: Trendell's Garden

The gardens were laid out by EJ Trendell in the 1850s. The ruins and walls are all Victorian follies.





4: Abingdon Abbey

There are no visible remains of the abbey church and claustral buildings. The outline of the church is marked in stones on the grass.

5: Abbey Buildings

This was the South range of the Abbey Buildings where business activities were carried out and includes the Checker and the Long Gallery.

6: The Mill Stream

The Mill Stream was dug in the 10th century to supply the Abbey mills. It powered corn and cloth fulling mills.





7: Abingdon Bridge

Abingdon Bridge dates from 1416 and ensured Abingdon's prosperity by putting it on the main trade route from London to the West.



8: Roysse Court

The Gothic gateway led into the yard of the old town grammar school re-founded by John Roysse in 1563. It occupied parts of the the former St John's Hospital founded in the 12th century as a lay infirmary.
